On behalf of all staff, thank you for your ongoing support.

I am also pleased to announce that, following a rigorous recruitment process to replace Mrs Roslyn Gall as she transitions to retirement in 2026, we are delighted to welcome Ms Lara Rice to our Leadership Team as our new Head of Department. Ms Rice will join us in Week 9 to ensure a thorough handover occurs before we farewell Mrs Gall at the end of the year. She joins us from Northern Beaches State High School with extensive experience in Senior Schooling and VET, as well as a strong curriculum background in Senior Mathematics and Sciences — including Maths Methods, Physics, and Chemistry. Her leadership

and expertise will greatly strengthen our curriculum delivery and senior pathways, and we are excited to welcome her to the Home Hill High community. This time of year is always particularly special as we prepare to farewell our graduating seniors while simultaneously welcoming the next generation of students to our school. I am pleased to share that most of our Year 12 students have already secured post-school pathways for 2026, reflecting their hard work, determination, and aspirations for the future.

Our Year 12 Valedictory Dinner will be held on Wednesday, 19 November, at the Burdekin Memorial Hall, followed by the formal Graduation Ceremony at the school on Thursday, 20

November. We look forward to welcoming parents, caregivers, and community members to join us in celebrating these milestone moments with our exiting seniors.

We are also excited to welcome our incoming Year 7s for 2026 during their final transition event, Head Start, on Friday, 28 November. On the same day, we will celebrate the achievements of our Year 10 and 11 students through a Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) Celebration before they begin their summer break. A separate PBL Celebration for Years 7–9 will be held on Friday, 5 December, recognising their outstanding efforts and successes throughout the year. We greatly value ongoing feedback from parents, caregivers, and community members about our PBL feedback and acknowledgement systems. If you have ideas or suggestions, please contact myself or our PBL Coordinator, Mrs Kym Ogomeni.

In terms of facilities, several major infrastructure and maintenance projects are progressing well. We have now received formal confirmation that asbestos removal works will take place during the summer school holidays, with initial preparation beginning in Week 10 of this term. From the start of the summer vacation, the school grounds will be completely closed, with no access permitted until clearance is provided by the specialist team — expected in mid-January 2026. Thank you for your patience as we undertake this essential safety work.

Finally, our work following this year's School Review continues to gather momentum. This term, we launched our Open Home Forum in D5 to support a comprehensive community consultation process as we shape our next four-year School Strategic Plan. All students and staff have now contributed through structured input cycles, and we are excited to welcome our broader community to participate next week. We warmly encourage all parents, caregivers, and community members to share their insights. Our final structured input cycle will be held on Tuesday, 18 November, from 2:00-4:00 pm, and all are welcome to attend. If this time does not suit, the doors to D5 will remain open throughout the week to provide opportunities for community input before the consultation period closes at the end of Week 7. Thank you for your continued support as we head into the final weeks of 2025. Home Hill State High School continues to thrive because of the strength of its students, staff, families, and community partnerships.

Important Dates – Year 12 Certificates and Results:

Final subject results and Senior Education
Profiles (SEPs) for 2025 Year 12 graduates will be
available from 9.00 am on Wednesday 17
December 2025 in the MyQCE Student Portal
website.

Students who are eligible for a QCE certificate will be able to access their official certificate/s via the QCE Achievement Award tab in their learning account in the MyQCE Student Portal website. It is important to remember that the school does not issue report cards for year 12; all certificates are issued by the QCAA through the MyQCE website. For this reason it is important that students check that they can log into MyQCE, and that the email address they have listed there is their personal email address, not their school email addresses. Students school email address will be de-activated within days of their final day of school.

Students who receive a QCIA will be sent a copy of the QCIA (Queensland Certificate of Individual Achievement) in the mail.

Information for Year 12 School Leavers:

Transition to Work is a federally funded program for 15-24 year olds, and can assist with employability skills, assistance with resume/cover letters, job search and interview skills. They may also have funding to help pay for things needed to gain employment. Busy at Work is the organisation that delivers TTW in the Burdekin. Unfortunately, if you have completed year 12, you will need to wait 6 months before they will be able to assist unless you are Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander. Busy at Work are advertising for a new employment consultant, in the meantime the Manager, Kerrie Fahey, and an employment consultant from Townsville are visiting the Burdekin each week. Kerrie has also organised for visits to Home Hill when needed - this is for young people who do not have any access to transport. Back to Work Jobseeker Support 2025-26 Funding Guidelines

What is Jobseeker Support?

The Back to Work program offers a range of services to support employers to address workforce challenges and to support jobseekers to gain and retain employment.

Jobseeker Support is one of the initiatives under the Back to Work program. It provides financial assistance to disadvantaged jobseekers to secure ongoing employment and supports individuals where there is an economic barrier to gaining or retaining employment.

Jobseeker Support aims to increase the employability skills of jobseekers and equip individuals with the skills and supports necessary to gain and maintain long-term employment.

Jobseeker Support is administered by the Department of Trade, Employment and Training (DTET).

Who can apply?

Jobseeker Support is available to jobseekers who identify as belonging to one or more of the following target groups:

- Young people aged 15-24 years who have been unemployed for a minimum of 8 weeks;
- First Nations people who have been unemployed for a minimum of 8 weeks;
- people with disability who have been unemployed for a minimum of 8 weeks;
- culturally and linguistically diverse people who have been unemployed for a minimum of 8 weeks;
- long-term unemployed people who have been unemployed for 52 weeks or more.

Your principal place of residency must be in Queensland and you must not have been a full-time student within the eight weeks directly prior to your period of unemployment commencing.

You must be either:

- An Australian citizen or
- an Australian permanent resident or
- a New Zealand citizen or
- a temporary resident with the necessary visa and work permits on the pathway to permanent residency.

What support can be funded?

Jobseeker Support cannot fund retrospective costs for goods and services purchased prior to your application being approved. Jobseeker Support provides financial support to eligible jobseekers to address barriers to employment. This could include costs associated with:

- driving lessons (up to a maximum of 10 lessons)
- . White Card, Blue Card, Yellow Card fees
- machinery tickets or other licences
- funding to purchase identification (birth certificate/driver licence/18+ card).
- uniforms and appropriate tools and equipment relevant to the chosen career path.

Funds under Jobseeker Support cannot fund:

- goods and services purchased prior to your application being approved
- vocational qualifications within the Australian Qualifications Framework (e.g. Certificate III courses)
- purchase of assets or capital equipment (e.g. laptops, tablet computers and mobile phones)
- contributions to wages for any future job you are appointed to.

To avoid duplication of services, funding is not available for the same services being delivered through other initiatives or programs including Skilling Queenslanders for Work or Australian Government initiatives.

Funding must be linked to a genuine employment opportunity. If the eligible jobseeker requires support outside of what is listed above, they may request consideration based on their individual circumstances.

How much funding is available?

The maximum amount of funding available is \$3000. This can be across multiple goods and services.

How can I apply for funding?

Applications must be submitted through an online portal on the Back to Work website. This asks you to provide details about:

- Yourself, including a copy of your identification;
- · your employment status;
- the support you are requesting, including at least one invoice/quote from an ABN-registered supplier detailing item(s) costs.



Applications must be completed directly by eligible jobseekers. If the applicant is under 18 years of age, then a signed consent form from a parent or guardian is required. Referrals from RTOs or employment agencies will not be accepted.

How many times can I apply?

You can only apply to Jobseeker Support once.

However, your application can include multiple goods and services up to a maximum value of \$3000.

What happens after I apply?

We will assess your application and the information you have provided to check that you are an eligible jobseeker and that you are applying to fund eligible goods and services. Your application will be assessed within 10 business days, subject to demand.

If you have not provided all the information we need, then we will contact you for more information.

If you have provided all the information and you are an eligible jobseeker applying to fund eligible goods and services, then we will let you know you application is successful and pay the invoices you provided.

Once the invoice/quote has been paid, it is your responsibility to access the goods or services. If your situation changes, then you should contact us at jobseekersupport@desbt.gld.gov.au.

How is the funding paid?

Funding is paid directly to the service provider or supplier for the invoice/quote provided. Funds will not be transferred directly to the applicant.

Jobseeker Support cannot fund retrospective costs for goods and services purchased prior to your application being approved.

Can I request a review of decision?

If your application is not approved, you can request a review of decision. Requests must be lodged within 21 business days of being notified that your application has been not approved.

Information for service providers and suppliers

If a customer has told you they are applying to access funds from Jobseeker Support, then you will need to provide them with an invoice/quote before they apply. If the application is successful, then we will pay you

directly. If you have any questions, then you should contact us at jobseekersupport@desbt.gld.gov.au.

DTET reserves the right to complete checks into the suitability of suppliers, to contact suppliers regarding the goods and services detailed in applications and to make funding decisions based on the availability of funds that allows funds to be allocated in the best interests of all eligible jobseekers.

Can I access support if I am a Back to Work supported employee at risk of losing my job?

Back to Work supported employees at risk of losing employment must contact the local DTET Team. The contact details of these regional offices can be found under relevant locations on the Back to Work website.

DTET Regional Teams can assist the employee and employer with access to the Harrison Tool for Retention and the Small Business Support Pool.

What happens if the program is discontinued?

Advice will be published on the Back to Work website if funding is no longer available or the program has been discontinued.

Privacy and confidentiality

The Privacy Collection Notice included in provision four of the Jobseeker Support Terms and Conditions available on the Back to Work website sets out how information collected as part of the application process will be used by the Queensland Government.

Broadly, the information can be used to evaluate, administer, assess, monitor and audit compliance with the eligibility criteria for the program in order to support delivery of the Jobseeker Support program.

Applicants must provide information for the purposes of assessing eligibility and must consent to disclose their personal details for the purposes set out in the privacy statement in the Terms and Conditions.

Human Rights consideration

The intention of the *Human Rights Act 2019* (the Act) is to ensure every person in Queensland is treated equally and without discrimination.

Although the eligibility criteria under Jobseeker Support is not extended to all Queenslanders and therefore may limit the rights of those that are unable to access it, this is described as reasonable and justifiable under the Act (Section 13(2)) as the intent of Jobseeker Support aims to achieve the purpose of the Act by supporting and encouraging equitable participation across a broad range of cohorts that generally face barriers to their participation in the labour market.

When being signed up as an apprentice, you will be visited by an Apprentice Connect Australia Provider (ACAP) who will complete the initial paperwork, speak to them about applying for the loan if this is an option you want to consider. They will advise what you need to do. Make sure you get the application as soon as possible, they will not back date payments – more information is available online.





Home Hill Students Growing Premium Inthanon Melons

Students at Home Hill State High School are once again getting their hands dirty and their minds growing with the planting of Inthanon Japanese Rockmelons inside the school's Protective Cropping Structure.

The Inthanon variety is highly regarded in Japanese and Southeast Asian markets for its exceptional sweetness, smooth netted rind, and fragrant aroma. These melons are often presented as premium gifts in Japan, where fruit quality, flavour, and presentation are highly valued. For our students, growing Inthanon melons offers a unique opportunity to understand export-quality production standards, controlled-environment horticulture, and global market expectations. Through this project, students are learning about climate management, fertigation precision, pollination, and biosecurity practices, as well as the importance of sustainable production methods that minimise environmental impact.

Another highlight has been the incredible success of the Lebanese Cucumbers, which went from seed to harvest in just 29 days. A remarkable turnaround! Students achieved a 100% germination rate, thanks to high-quality seed generously donated by Rijk Zwaan, who have also provided a wonderful selection of lettuce and cucumber varieties for students to trial.

Adding a fun and creative twist, the students have also been inspired by the classic tale Jack and the Beanstalk — growing their very own "beanstalks" of green and purple broad beans that climb skyward inside the greenhouse. We are enjoying having the DPI work so closely with us – thankyou Heidi. We look forward to sharing our successes in the weeks to come.
